Discuss Master Plan deliverables submitted by Dodson and Flinker.

The Board went through Dodson and Flinker's Collated Action Plan, they had Sarah Reynold's draft and added to it.

  Bob Nelson made a motion to approve the Minutes of January 2<sup>nd</sup>, January 16<sup>th</sup> and February 6<sup>th</sup>, 2025. Bill Harker seconded the motion. All in favor.
- 3. <u>Letter from Marguerite Willis re: Laundromat / Sewer</u>
  Bob Nelson read the letter regarding the need to figure out sewer capacity for a laundromat in town. Bill asked Star to respond to Marguerite thanking her and that they will take it into consideration.

## **Appointments:**

#### 6:15 Jonathan Mirin, 5G setback draft and site plan 225 Avery Brook Rd.

Jonathan Mirin read his draft language for the zoning bylaw update that he hopes the Planning Board will bring to Town Meeting. His proposed setback number was 1500 feet. Right now, the setback is 0 feet from someone's house for a small cell tower. The large monopole cell towers are still at 800'. Lori is fine with putting in a number but wants it to be reasonable. Bob said there isn't enough time to do it before this town meeting. They would like to read the language in an email. Jonathan had sent the draft. They will read it and possibly pursue it in time for the following year's Annual Town Meeting.

Jonathan said that a proactive Board can do a lot to create a bit more leverage for the Town to be able to decide where it is appropriate to put the macro cell towers and small cells. Heath did 1500' for macro and 750' for small cell.

Jonathan spoke about his vision for adding cabins to his Art and Ecology center behind the Barn at 224 Avery Brook Rd. (Formerly 225 Avery Brook rd.) He now owns the barn. He asked if he would need a substantial driveway. Without seeing any real plans, the Board supposes that yes, he will need a driveway that could support emergency vehicles turning around.

Shaine Meulmeister and Dillon Sussman came in to go over their deliverables. They took feedback on the Master Plan survey, the Collated Action Plan, nothing new from the fact sheets, and the Issues and Opportunities pages.

Dillon let Bill Harker know that the consultants planned on the Planning Board giving feedback first, getting feedback from the other Boards. Bill had been concerned that decisions were being made without Parks and Rec weighing in.
